The Marine Corps Air Ground Task Force Training Command (MAGTFTC), Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center (MCAGCC) is the Marine Corps' premier live-fire training installation.



Located in the Mojave Desert near Joshua Tree National Park, MAGTFTC, MCAGCC is the only place with enough land and airspace

to carry out the Marine Corps' mandate to conduct realistic, combined-arms training at the Marine Expeditionary Brigade level.


MAGTFTC, MCAGCC also is a premier environmental steward, leading the way in energy and solid waste management, and cultural and natural resources conservation programs.

In 2011, MAGTFTC, MCAGCC had an estimated economic impact of \$1.7 billion on the local economy, with \$1.2 billion of value added.

### MAGTFTC ORGANIZATIONS

» Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron One (MAWTS-1): Provides standardized advanced tactical training and certification of unit instructor qualifications that support Marine Aviation training and readiness and to provide assistance in the development and employment of aviation weapons and tactics.

**U.S. Marine Corps** 

- » Marine Corps Mountain Warfare Training Center (MCMWTC): Conducts unit and individual training courses to prepare Marine Corps, Joint, and Allied Forces for operations in mountainous, high altitude and cold weather environments; and the development of warfighting doctrine and specialized equipment for use in mountain and cold weather operations.
- » Tactical Training Exercise Control Group (TTECG): Develops, coordinates, executes, and evaluates training and education concepts, policies, plans, and programs to ensure Marines are prepared to meet the challenges of present and future operational environments.
- Marine Corps Logistics Operations Group (MCLOG): Provides standardized, advanced individual training in MAGTF logistics operations and unit readiness planning at the Battalion and Regimental levels, conducts Battle Staff Training, facilitates logistics education and manages doctrine, training standards, tactics and institutional training programs in order to enhance combat preparation and performance of Logistics Combat Element units in MAGTF operations.
- » Marine Corps Tactics and Operations Group (MCTOG): Provides advanced training in tactics and operations and ensures the synchronization of training standards for ground-combat units.

### **TENANT COMMANDS**

» 7th Marine Regiment ("The Magnificent Seventh"): Conducts mechanized, combinedarms operations and other expeditionary operations in order to support theater engagement plans and contingency operations.

U.S. Marine Corps

- Ist Tank Battalion ("1st Tanks"): Provides combat power to the 1st Marine Division using expeditionary armor-protected firepower, shock effect, and maneuver in support of the MAGTF across the range of military operations.
- » 3rd Battalion 11th Marines: Provides direct support fires to 7th Marine Regiment and general support and reinforcing fires to other maneuver elements of 1st Marine Division during combat operations.
- » 3rd Light Armored Reconnaissance (LAR) Battalion ("Wolfpack"): Conducts reconnaissance, security, and economy of force operations, and within its capabilities, limited offensive or delaying operations that exploit the unit's mobility and firepower.
- » 3rd Assault Amphibian Battalion (3D AABN) D Company: Lands the surface assault element of the landing force and their equipment in a single lift during amphibious operations; conducts mechanized operations and related combat support in subsequent operations ashore.
- » 4th Tank Battalion ("4th Tanks") D Company: Provides combat power to the 1st Marine Division using expeditionary armor-protected firepower, shock effect, and maneuver in support of the MAGTF across the range of military operations.
- » Combat Logistics Battalion 7 (CLB-7): Provides direct support combat logistics to I Marine Expeditionary Force units based at MAGTFTC, MCAGCC, as well as the Exercise Support Division, Marine Corps exercise forces operating at MAGTFTC, MCAGCC, and MCAGCC base beyond their organic capabilities and as directed by the Commanding General, 1st Marine Logistics Group.
- Marine Corps Communication-Electronics School (MCCES): MCCES is the largest Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) School in the Marine Corps and trains Marines in ground electronics maintenance, tactical communications, and air control/anti-warfare operations and maintenance in order to ensure that U.S. Marine Corps commanders have the ability to exercise command and control throughout the operational environment.
- » Marine Wing Support Squadron (MWSS-374): Responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Strategic Expeditionary Landing Field at MAGTFTC, MCAGCC Twentynine Palms.
- » Marine Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Squadron 1 ("Watchdogs"): Provides aerial surveillance for I MEF. The unit also provides reconnaissance, surveillance, and target acquisition to units participating in the Integrated Training Exercise program.
- » Robert E. Bush Naval Hospital: Dedicated to providing patient and family-centered care to the active-duty and retired families of MAGTFTC, MCAGCC and surrounding communities.
- » 23<sup>rd</sup> Dental Company: Provides comprehensive dental care to active-duty MAGTFTC, MCAGCC personnel.
