

## U.S. Army FORT HUNTER LIGGETT : CALIFORNIA

Fort Hunter Liggett is the largest installation in the Army Reserve, with more than 165,000 acres of un-encroached mountains, valleys, rivers, plains, and forests, providing ideal maneuver areas to meet today's training requirements. Fort Hunter Liggett's ranges, training areas and facilities support year-round joint, multi-component, and interagency training.

In 1940, the War Department purchased 200,000 acres of local ranch land in the Salinas River Valley for what was to become Fort Hunter Liggett.



The varied terrain, Mediterranean climate, and size of Fort Hunter Liggett offer an ideal site for training and defense testing. To this day, the installation provides yeararound, joint, multi-component,

and interagency training. Fort Hunter Liggett (FHL) oversees and supports its sub-installation, Parks Reserve Forces Training Area (PRFTA) in Dublin, California.

# FORT HUNTER LIGGETT: CALIFORNIA

### **UNIT MISSIONS**

» 91st Training Brigade (Training Support): Conducts Warrior Exercises (WAREX) and Combat Support Training Exercises (CSTX), and other requirements for brigade headquarters, subordinate units, and staff on collective tasks to ensure they are trained and prepared for deployment. As directed, the 91st Training Division provides training to joint, combined, and active forces.

U.S. Army

- » 80th Training Command (TASS): Trains Soldiers in more than 50 military occupational specialties to fight and win our wars, provide humanitarian assistance, and accomplish other missions to keep our nation strong.
- » 3rd Brigade, 356th Logistic Support Battalion: Conducts logistics readiness operations in support of the 402nd Field Artillery Brigade. Provides personnel and equipment in support of post-mobilization training for units deploying the theater of operations. On order, provide premobilization training for select units, in accordance with U.S. Army Forces Command and U.S. Army Reserve Command training guidelines.
- » Logistical Readiness Center: Support the Soldiers by providing logistical programs and services that enable Soldier readiness.
- » 63rd Regional Support Command's Equipment Concentration Site 170: Provides equipment to units.
- » 31st Seabee Readiness Group: Provides support to the Commanders, First Naval Construction Regiment, 9th Naval Construction Regiment, 30th Naval Construction Regiment, and their subordinate units. Serves as the personnel receiving and processing activity for deployed Pacific Fleet Naval Construction Force units. In addition to training new personnel in transit, also provides support to active duty personnel family members through the Family Support Groups.
