NAVAL BASE VENTURA COUNTY: CALIFORNIA

Formed in 2000, Naval Base Ventura County (NBVC) is comprised of three operating facilities in Southern California: Port Hueneme, Point Mugu and San Nicolas Island. Each facility is distinct and offers a large variety of shore services. Its superior location and



lack of encroachment is critical to supporting military readiness.

Home to more than 80 military commands, NBVC is a major aviation

shore command and Naval construction force mobilization base.

Notably, NBVC provides a railhead, airfield, and deep-sea port under a single command.

NBVC's total economic impact is \$1.9 billion.

INSTALLATIONS

Naval Construction Battalion Center Port Hueneme: Port Hueneme is a deepwater port located north of Los Angeles, in an area known as "The Gold Coast," on the Oxnard Plane. It is one of the few military ports on the West Coast. The U.S. Navy uses Port Hueneme as a construction, maintenance, and engineering base. As such, the port provides a critical homeport for administrative, logistics, and training for U.S. Navy's Construction Forces, commonly referred to as the "Seabees". The port has over 300 acres of lay-down space and 16 miles of railroad with portside access.

Naval Air Warfare Center Point Mugu: Point Mugu is located in a largely agrarian area north of Los Angeles. Notably, Point Mugu contains one of the largest coastal salt marsh estuaries (2,500 acres) in Southern California. At Point Mugu, the Navy operates and maintains air station facilities and provides support services for Commander, Airborne Command Control and Logistics Wing; Naval Air Warfare Center, Weapons Division; Naval Test Wing Pacific; and other assigned tenants. These services include providing and maintaining an air terminal, air traffic control, outlying landing facility at San Nicolas Island, and firefighting and crash crews.

San Nicolas Island: San Nicolas Island is located 65 miles south of Point Mugu, in the Pacific Ocean. The island is the most remote island of the Channel Islands and is fully owned and operated by the U.S. Navy. The U.S. Navy primarily uses the island as a launch platform for short and medium range missile testing, as an observation facility for missile testing and as a training facility for littoral combat. The island is home to Naval Outlying Field San Nicolas Island (a military airport) and numerous surveillance and tracking radars.
