



OVERVIEW

In Fiscal Year (FY) 2022, the state of Utah received \$6.1 billion in Defense spending, which provides direct funding for the Department of Defense (DOD) personnel salaries, defense contracts, and construction of military facilities in the state. This spending by DOD personnel, contractors, and their families creates significant economic activity, attracts related industries and investments, and generates important state and local government tax revenues.

The Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration (REPI) Program is a key tool used by DOD and its partners to protect the military's ability to train, test, and operate in the state. The Department created the REPI Program in response to the development of lands and loss of habitat in the vicinity of or affecting its installations, ranges, and airspace that can lead to restrictions or costly and inadequate training and testing alternatives. Through the REPI Program, DOD works with state and local governments, conservation organizations, and willing private landowners to address these challenges to the military mission and the viability of DOD installations and ranges. The REPI Program has benefited from broad bipartisan support both in the U.S. Congress and among groups representing state and local officials. From FY 2016 through FY 2023, DOD and its partners have contributed nearly \$62.3 million to REPI projects supporting two installations in Utah.







MILITARY PRESENCE

- Utah is home to Air Force's second largest base, Hill Air Force Base, which has an economic impact of more than \$3 billion annually to the State and employs 21,000 personnel.
- Camp Williams consists of over 23,000 acres of combat training areas with desert and mountain terrain similar to the environments encountered in current overseas operating areas and provides a high quality training environment for Guard, Reserve, and Active Duty soldiers.
- In 2011, the National Security Agency constructed a \$1.5 billion data center in Camp Williams that now serves as one of the largest data repositories and plays a significant role in monitoring cybersecurity threats.
- Utah's defense industry directly and indirectly supported over 211,000 jobs and \$19.3 billion in economic activity.
